Aquarium and Hands-on Exhibits View local marine life and interact with animals at the Aquarium Teaching Tank.

Terrapin Station Visit educational exhibits to learn about turtles and horseshoe crabs and then head over to the Turtle Basking Tanks and Horseshoe Crab Hatchery.

Nature and Birding Trail Explore the salt marsh on our $\frac{1}{4}$ mile scenic walking trail and get a unique view of the wetland ecosystem from our 720ft-long elevated marsh walkway.

Wildlife and Habitat Gardens Stroll through our native plant gardens.

Observation Tower and Deck Climb our 3-story tower for amazing views of the wetlands and surrounding area.

Into the Wild

Wetlands are extraordinary habitats to explore with incredible wildlife to discover. Are you ready to take the plunge into this adventure?



Earth Rocks

The Earth is so much more interesting than just the ground you walk on. We'll take a deeper dig into geology, especially along the coast.



Into the Woods

Forestry is an interesting science that helps us understand the relationship of the habitat, its inhabitants, and human needs as well. You'll be able to tell the forest *and* the trees.

Boy Scout Merit Badges

The Wetlands Institute Instructor is a registered Boy Scout Merit Badge Counselor and will be able to sign the Scouts' Blue Merit Badge cards for the following Merit Badges*:



Bird Study

Birds are the most watchable wildlife, offering everything from a pleasant glance, an enjoyable hobby, or a rewarding career. We'll practice using binoculars and field guides, and head outside to observe the birds of the salt marsh.



Environmental Science

~ Eagle Required Merit Badge

Using the salt marsh habitat to delve into the topics of ecology, pollution, and endangered species, and compare species composition in two salt marsh areas.



Fish & Wildlife Management

Discover fish and wildlife management in NJ through the wildlife of the wetlands. We cover current threats to NJ species, management basics, and ways scouts can help wildlife. A wildlife walk and seine netting activity (weather permitting) lets scouts see some of the species in our protected salt marsh.



Geocaching

GPS units are great tools for helping us get from one place to the next without using a traditional paper map. But they can also be used to locate "caches" hidden anywhere in the world through this exciting treasure hunt game.



Insect Study

Insects and their arthropod cousins are around us all of the time. Yes, some are pests, but most are very beneficial, and all are totally interesting.



Nature

Explore the relationships between plants and animals, construct a food web, and build a bird house to take home. We practice observing nature by looking for signs of the birds, reptiles, fish, and other animals of the marsh.



Oceanography

Explore the branches of Oceanography, practice measuring the properties of water, and take a closer look at live plankton! Part of the lesson takes place at the beach or the Institute's floating dock.



Plant Science

Plant scientists use their curiosity and knowledge to develop questions about the world of plants. Then they try to answer those questions with further observations and experiments in the laboratory and in the field.



Reptiles & Amphibians

Developing knowledge about reptiles and amphibians leads to an appreciation for all native wildlife; understanding the life cycle of a reptile or amphibian and knowing about venomous species can help Scouts to be prepared to help in case of an emergency.



Soil & Water Conservation

Conservation isn't just the responsibility of soil and plant scientists alone. It is the duty of every person to learn more about the natural resources on which our lives depend so we can help make sure these resources are used wisely and cared for properly.

~ Eagle Required Merit Badge

Identifying and evaluating our impact on natural resources is the first step in understanding what we can do to make a difference.

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Please note: Many badges require the Scout to make long-term observations or to pursue knowledge or skills not directly related to the topic. Due to time constraints scouts will need to independently perform some of the activities which are required to complete badges. Scouts may submit proof of completion of independent requirements for signed approval.

Traditional In-person Program Prices:

\$10 per Scout member and non-leader chaperones. Troop leaders are free!

Group Size: Minimum of 10 Scouts per program.

Virtual Program Prices: \$75 Virtual Program Fee plus \$8 per participating Scout member and non-leader chaperones. Troop leaders are free!

Group Size: Maximum of 25 Scout members per program.

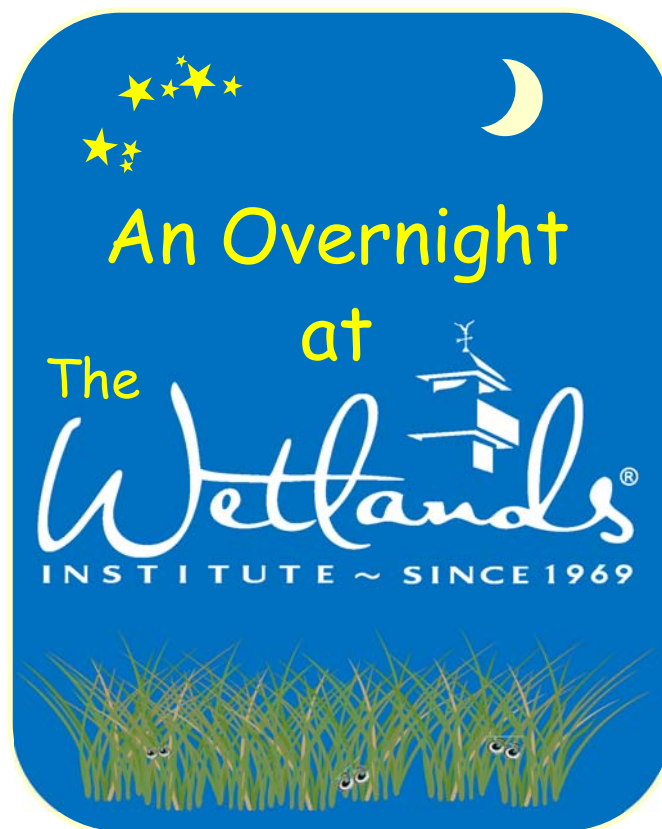
